What's in a Name? "Compliance" vs. "Audit"



- Compliance
 - May be referred to as a monitoring, reviews, compliance checks, etc.
 - Completed by a supervisor, agency level, or both.
 - Ensuring policies and procedures are being followed.
 - Are we doing what we said we would do?

Why a "Compliance" Program Is Important



Why a Compliance Program Is Important



- BWCs document everything your officers do or fail to do;
 There's now a visual record
- Ensures evidence is being captured
- Protects your officers
- Protects the agency
- Validates your commitment to your community and agency values
- Enhances transparency and accountability
- Helps manage performance
- Validates and supports training

Why a "Compliance" Program Is Important



Your organizational culture is being captured!

Program Scope: What Are You Attempting to Learn?



- Is your agency operating as desired?
- Are you following all polices but especially your BWC policy?
- Are organizational culture and core values reflected in what you see?
- Have all officers been properly trained or are their training gaps?
- Are you complying with the law?
- Can you identify risks to the agency?

Levels of "Compliance" Review



Consider two levels:

Supervisory



Agency



Supervisory Review



- Policy compliance
- General performance
- Behavior
- Knowledge
- Tactics
- Application of law
- Officer safety
- Communications skills
- And the list goes on....Essentially, what supervisors always have looked at



Supervisory Review



- "X" number of videos
- "X" amount of length
- "X" number of times a month
- Looking for "X" (directed from the agency)
- Documented and forwarded

This level of review should be considered a first-line supervisory tool and not regarded as an agency level compliance process

And it doesn't guarantee policy compliance!

Agency Review Process



- BWC activation and deactivation policy compliance
- All other policy compliance
- Video content for review and analysis
- Organizational culture
- Operational effectiveness
- Risk avoidance, mitigation, or elimination



Agency Review



- Designated agency level person or section
- Looks at "compliance" from the viewpoint of the agency; risk management
- Uniform compliance across the agency
- Size of agency is immaterial
- Expectations are that it is being done, so have a process
- Directing supervisory review criteria





- Integrating agency sections such as detectives and professional standards in the process. Most importantly...the chain of command
- Managing the reporting and feedback mechanisms
- Process documentation






- Don't confuse the process of compliance with a process for discipline
- Some of what is found may lead to discipline based on severity
- The compliance process is about making the agency better
- However... policy, without policy enforcement, isn't really a policy
- It's a balancing act for the agency

Why Is It important?



- Ensures effective operation of the "compliance" process
- Validates compliance with policy, procedures, and laws
- Instills confidence in functions
- Aids in maintaining and enhancing community trust
- Due diligence

- Validation for the officers, agency, and community






