THE ENCOUNTER

BWCs can capture:

- 1. The announcements
- 2. The "alert"
- 3. The actions of the K-9 and handler
- 4. The suspect's actions

THE REVIEW

BWCs provide evidence for:

- 1. Internal after-action review (bite investigation)
- 2. Community member complaints
- 3. Prosecutors, judges, juries
- 4. City attorney (civil litigation)



THE TRAINING

BWCs can be used in training to:

- 1. Review good and bad deployments
- 2. Review handler/K-9 communication
- 3. Review K-9 behavior (correction, retraining)
- 4. Develop scenario-based training
